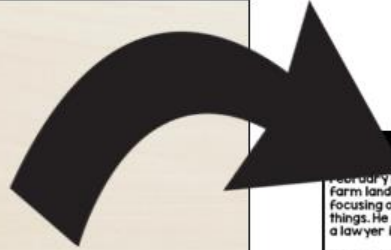

A LOOK AT THE FLIP BOOK



As a child, Abraham Lincoln lived in a log cabin. He was born February 12, 1809 in Kentucky. His family moved to Indiana for more farm land. He had to work on the farm land as a child instead of focusing on school. He still loved to read and teach himself new things. He taught himself about laws, which helped when he became a lawyer in Illinois.

Abraham Lincoln was the United States' 16th president. He served as president from 1861 until 1865. During his time as president, he achieved many things. One of the most important things he did was work towards the freedom of slaves. During that time, the country was split on whether slavery was right or wrong. This caused the Civil War to begin. At the end of the war, he declared that slavery had to end. Sadly, soon after this event, he was shot by John Wilkes Booth. This was a man who did not agree with Lincoln's new decision about slavery.

America still honors Abraham Lincoln. In Washington D.C., there is a building to honor him called the Lincoln Memorial. His face is also carved into Mount Rushmore, on the \$5 bill, and on the penny.

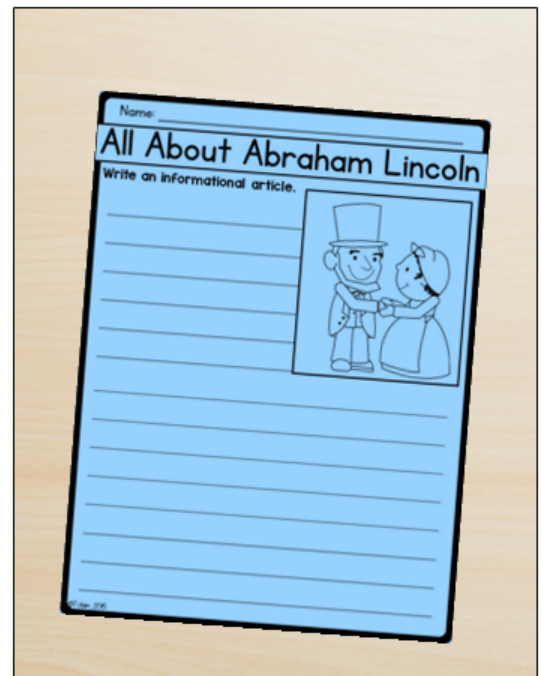
